Hate Crime vs Hate Incident

A hate *crime* is a criminal act committed against a person, group or property because of one or more of the following actual or perceived characteristics of the victim:

- Disability
- Religion

Gender

- Sexual Orientation
- Nationality
- •Association with a person or group with
- Race or Ethnicity
- one or more of these characteristics

A hate *Incident* is an action or behavior motivated by hate or bias, but legally protected by the First Amendment. Examples include:



- Name-calling
- * Insults and Epithets
- * Distributing hate material in public places
- Displaying hate material on your own property

A Note on Hate Speech—

The U.S. Constitution allows hate speech as long as it does not interfere with the civil rights of others. If this type of speech escalates to threats against a person or property, it may become a hate crime.

Reporting a Hate Crime

EMERGENCIES. If you are in immediate danger and need to report an emergency, dial **9-1-1** and advise if medical attention is needed.

NON-URGENT MATTERS. To report a non-urgent incident that occurred in Pittsburg, CA call (925) 646-2441

BE PREPARED. Be prepared to speak with a dispatcher by identifying your **location**, **name** and **contact information**

- Write down the exact words that were spoken and any other information that may be of value
- Save any evidence, if safe, wait for officers to respond to take photographs
- If possible get a description of the perpetrator (sex, race, height, etc.) and the perpetrators vehicle (color, make, model, license plate)

Indicators

The following signs may indicate that a hate crime has been committed:

- A victim or witness perceives, or property was targeted, because they /it belonged to a protected class
- Written or verbal comments were made showing prejudice or bias
- The crime occurred on a significant date to the victims protected class
- There is ongoing organized hate group activity in the area

If YOU are a VICTIM

KNOW YOUR RIGHTS! Victims have certain rights under the California Constitution's Victim's Bill of Rights. These include your right to—

- ⇒ Apply for money to cover your losses
- ⇒ Give a victim impact statement to the court
- ⇒ Ask the prosecutor for certain information about the case
- ⇒ Get orders from the court such as protective orders or an order to pay attorney fees
- ⇒ Under the Ralph Act and Bane Act, the court may require the defendant to pay a civil penalty for violating your rights

After reporting the crime to the police department, you can seek additional assistance from:

Contra Costa County Victim Witness Assistance
Program. A DA Victim Advocate can provide
guidance through the legal system, help you
apply for victims compensation, and offer
resources to agencies and organizations that offer
assistance and emergency services.
