



City Council Policy

- Keep our neighborhoods safe
- "ongoing revenues pay for ongoing expenses"
- Support reconfiguration of government
- We oppose State raids!
 - Support the Local Taxpayer, Public Safety and Transportation Protection Act
 - "Securitized" the property taxes that the State borrowed
 - Committed our redevelopment monies and didn't have the \$17.8 million the State demanded for their own budget

City-Wide Capital Improvements

- 14 projects totaling \$34 million completed in the last year
 - Including \$3 million Civic Center area improvements in anticipation of new Courthouse, other development
 - \$7.2 million recycled water system to reduce use of treated water for irrigation
 - o \$14 million in new water facilities for southern hills
- Total 5 Year Investment in Pittsburg infrastructure: \$119 million over 5 years to improve parks, streets, storm drains, traffic signals and water facilities



• \$154 million total investment from Redevelopment Agency, Capital Improvement Program, Bonds, Grants and other funds to improve the quality of life in Pittsburg







 - 269 juvenile arrests




- 16,652 calls for service 1st quarter 2010

 - 52 juvenile arrests





Violent Crimes




2009 Violent Crimes Comparison











General Fund Revenues

Budget Stabilization Account & Reserves

- This fiscal year we used \$1.02 million
- June 2010 projected to have \$5.7 million
- Using \$1.26 million in FY2010/11
- Not compromising City Council principles
- Developing plan to guarantee ongoing financial health

20% General Fund Reserve 15% Budget Stabilization Reserve

Labor Negotiations

- Our employees partnered with us
- 3 year contracts with our non-safety employees
 - Cut pension costs by 7%
 - Cut city-paid health insurance by ~ 8%
 - Reduced by ~ \$26 million future retiree health costs
- Police delayed July 2009 pay raise by 15 months
- Police contracts expire June 2011



Finance Next Steps



New Budget Reporting Tool

- o FY2009/10 budget document ~ 600 pages
- o FY2010/11 budget document ~ 200 pages
- Finance working on new format for greater transparency

Budget Stability Plan

- Multi-year approach to bring revenue & expenses into balance
- Need to bridge annual gap of \$2.8 million
- o Designed to smooth "peaks" and "valleys" of future years


