23.0 CONSULTING AND COORDINATION

The City of Pittsburg (City) has made efforts to inform interested parties and solicit input on the proposed project through a variety of methods, including one public scoping meeting, several one-on-one agency briefings, one public comment meeting, and other community-wide notifications through the City's website and mailings.

23.1 SCOPING PROCESS

Scoping is the process used under the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) to determine the coverage and content of an Environmental Impact Report (EIR), and it offers the opportunity for public review and comment in the early phases of a project. Section 15083 of the CEQA Guidelines authorizes and encourages an early consultation or scoping process to help identify the range of actions, alternatives, mitigation measures, and significant effects to be analyzed in depth in an EIR and to help resolve concerns of affected agencies and individuals.

The scoping process for an EIR is typically initiated by publication of the Notice of Preparation (NOP), which constitutes a formal notice to the public and to interested agencies and organizations that an EIR is in preparation for a proposed project.

23.1.1 Notice of Preparation

In July 2011, the City issued the project NOP to inform agencies and the public that an EIR was being prepared, inviting comments on the scope and content as well as attendance to a public scoping meeting. (See Appendix Q: Notice of Preparation for the complete text of the NOP.) The NOP was distributed to an extensive list of recipients within the City and Contra Costa County, including residents in areas potentially affected by the proposed project. The City also posted notices on its website and ran a public notice announcing the scoping meeting in the *Contra Costa Times*.

23.1.2 Scoping Meeting

The City held one public scoping meeting on August 4, 2011 at City Hall at 65 Civic Avenue in Pittsburg, California. Approximately 25 interested residents and representatives from various agencies and organizations attended the meeting. The scoping meeting included an overview of the meeting's purpose, a description of the proposed project, potentially significant environmental issues, and a question-answer session where attendees were given the opportunity to ask

questions to members of the technical and environmental team. Attendees were given the opportunity to provide oral or written comments. Agencies and other groups who provided comments during the scoping process include the following:

23.1.3 Draft EIR

A Draft EIR for the project was made available for public comment for a 45-day public review period beginning on June 12, 2012 and ending on July 27, 2012. As described in Chapter 1.0: Introduction, after the close of the public comment period, the City determined it was necessary to add significant new information to the Draft EIR and, therefore, has prepared the Recirculated Draft EIR.

During the previous public comment period for the Draft EIR, the City held one public comment meeting on July 17, 2012 at City Hall at 65 Civic Avenue in Pittsburg, California. Approximately 15 interested residents and representatives from various agencies and organizations attended the meeting. The public comment meeting included an overview of the meeting's purpose, a description of the proposed project, potentially significant environmental issues, and a public commenting session where attendees were given the opportunity to make oral comments on the Draft EIR.
